Japan Credit Rating Agency, Ltd. (JCR) announces the following credit rating.

Dai-ichi Life Holdings, Inc. (security code: 8750)

Rationale

- (1) Dai-ichi Life Group is Japan's second-largest life insurance group in terms of the size of policies in force, with the core The Dai-ichi Life Insurance Company, Limited ("Dai-ichi Life"), The Dai-ichi Frontier Life Insurance Co., Ltd., The Neo First Life Insurance Company, Limited, U.S.-based Protective Life Corporation, TAL Dai-ichi Life Australia Pty Limited, and other companies under the umbrella of the holding company, Dai-ichi Life Holdings, Inc. ("Dai-ichi Life HD"). It operates mainly domestic life insurance business, as well as overseas life insurance, asset management, and other businesses. While JCR has been seeing the interest rate risk of life insurers as a relatively large constraint on the rating, Dai-ichi Life Group has clearly indicated its intention to reduce asset management risk, and has in particular been steadily reducing its interest rate risk. The Group's sensitivity of economic value-based indicators has decreased through risk reduction, and JCR expects this trend to continue in the future. Despite the considerably stressed business environment, it has been securing a certain level of earnings capacity on the back of a solid business foundation and diversified earnings sources. Based on the above, determining the Group's creditworthiness as equivalent to AA, JCR has upgraded the issuer ratings of both Dai-ichi Life HD and Dai-ichi Life by one notch.
- (2) Dai-ichi Life Group differs from other major life insurance groups in management system, because it is only a joint-stock company among 4 major life insurance groups and has a holding company structure. It has been promoting measures for expansion of its enterprise value including meeting diversified customers' needs in domestic market and proactively working on overseas business development. It has established "multi-brand and multi-channel" structure from early on and has firmly established diversified and specialized sales channels for the domestic operations. Dai-ichi Frontier Life operates bancassurance business, boasting the top-class sales record in this market, and Neo First Life provides insurance through its independent insurance agency base. In January 2023, Dai-ichi Life HD made ipet Insurance Co., Ltd. a subsidiary, aiming to expand customer contacts through pet insurance. Its overseas life insurance companies including Protective Life and TAL Dai-ichi Life Australia are increasing their profit contributions. In November 2022, Dai-ichi Life HD made New Zealand-based life insurer Partners Group Holdings Limited a subsidiary. Although the overseas subsidiaries' performance has been affected by interest rate fluctuations, they are the largest profit contributor among the major life insurance groups, accounting for more than 20% of the Group's adjusted profit.
- (3) The Group's policy performance has been solid, with annualized premiums for new policies increasing year-on-year in the fiscal year ended March 2022 (FY2021) and the first half of FY2022, mainly due to increased sales of foreign currency-denominated products at Dai-ichi Frontier Life. With the welldiversified earnings sources, differences in the Group's consolidated and the core company's unconsolidated business performances are beginning to expand. The number of policies in force for third-sector products, on which it focuses, is on an increasing trend, and it has been stably securing relatively large mortality gains. Despite a recent surge in COVID-19 related claims and benefit



payments, the Group's adjusted profit has remained solid. The special treatment for "deemed hospitalization" has already been reviewed, and the downward pressure on profit is expected to be limited to FY2022. Its product mix of policies in force is gradually changing as it focuses more on protection products. JCR will continue to pay attention to whether it can maintain the risk-return balance of each product and stably accumulate the amount of increase in EEV associated with the results of sales activities such as value of new business.

- (4) The capital adequacy relative to risk is in line with the AA range rating, due to the accumulation of retained earnings, including various types of reserves. The ESR, which indicates soundness based on economic value, was 228% at the end of September 2022, a level that allows it to maintain soundness even under stress. Regarding ESR, in addition to the level, it is also important to reduce the sensitivity through measures such as reduction of interest rate risk. Dai-ichi Life Group has been more conscious of maintaining capital levels based on economic value and controlling market risk, and has reduced the amount of market-related risks, including interest rate risk, and the sensitivity has also decreased. The Group also uses reinsurance schemes for insurance blocks with high assumed rate of interest. It has built an integrated management system for earnings and capital based on risk management through development of ERM system. Management of risk-return balance has become widespread, including the use of economic value-based evaluation in management plans, sales strategies, asset management policies, and others. The speed at which the environment surrounding the industry is changing is rapid, requiring flexible responses in product strategies and asset management policies. Since the Group has many group companies, the importance of global and group-wide ERM is increasing.
- (5) In response to a case of illegal acquisition of money by a former employee announced in October 2020, Dai-ichi Life has been implementing various measures to prevent recurrence, mainly through the management quality reform project led by the president. JCR will watch whether an effective compliance system can be established to prevent similar problems from occurring.

Issuer: Dai-ichi Life Holdings, Inc.

Dai-ichi Life Holdings, Inc. ("Dai-ichi Life HD") is the holding company of the Dai-ichi Life Group. The issuer rating of Dai-ichi Life HD is one notch below the Dai-ichi Life Group's group creditworthiness. JCR reflects the structural subordination of a holding company in the rating on Dai-ichi Life HD, taking into account the high level of the double leverage ratio, while it has good cash flow backed by earnings capacity of its subsidiaries. However, Dai-ichi Life HD has indicated that it intends to reduce the double leverage ratio, and JCR will pay attention to the Group's capital policy and Dai-ichi Life HD's stand-alone balance of debt and equity financing.

Issuer: The Dai-ichi Life Insurance Company, Limited

The Dai-ichi Life Insurance Company, Limited ("Dai-ichi Life") is a core company of the Dai-ichi Life Group. The issuer rating of Dai-ichi Life is equivalent to the Dai-ichi Life Group's group creditworthiness. Dai-ichi Life has a solid business foundation with one of the largest size of policies in force. Although the number of sales staff, the group's main channel, has been declining, the training and retention rates have been improving as a result of stricter hiring practices and longer training periods under a policy that places more emphasis on quality. Dai-ichi Life's basic strategy is to increase customer satisfaction through customer-driven marketing and use of digital technology. Its flexible product development in response to diverse needs and flexible response to changes in the business environment have resulted in a solid policy performance.

The likelihood of a given debt payment is highly conditional to its issuer's business bases - how they can be maintained/ expanded into the future and thereby secure earnings and cash flows in adequacy and in a sustainable way.

B) Financial Grounds and Asset Quality

The likelihood of debt payment is highly dependent on the degree of the issuer's indebtedness and loss absorption capacity in terms of equity capital. Also notable is that a financial institution might see a significant loss of financial grounds as a result of changes in value of the assets under its possession.

C) Liquidity Positions

The likelihood of debt payment is highly dependent on the adequacy of the issuer's cash and other sources of repayment (liquidity positions).

D) Related Parties' Status and Stance of Support/ Assistance for the Issuer

The likelihood of debt payment is affected one way or the other by the issuer's related parties such as parent company, subsidiary, guarantor, and the government of the issuer's business domicile, etc. - by their own conditions and/ or position of support/ assistance for the issuer.

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E) Order of Seniority in Debt Payment

The likelihood of debt payment can be different between given debts of the same issuer. The likelihood of debt payment for an individual debt is dependent on the issuer's discretion, and/ or its rank relative to other debts of the same issuer in the order of seniority in principal/ interest payment which is determined by design as financial product or by laws, etc.

A) Business Bases

The credit rating is subject to alteration if there is improvement or deterioration of the issuer's business bases, since its revenue, etc. may improve or deteriorate by the change in its business management policies, clients' preferences, competitive situation, or a technological innovation. The resultant alteration of the credit rating is usually by a notch, with possibility of a few notches if and when the change in the business bases is large.

B) Financial Grounds and Asset Quality

The credit rating is subject to alteration if the issuer increases/ decreases its debt/ capital or vice versa and thereby makes its individual debt payment liability less or more bearable and its loss absorption capacity into the future decreased or increased. Also, the changes in the quality of asset under the issuer's holding may affect the credit rating, since such changes could raise or lower the likelihood of future loss of the issuer's financial grounds. The resultant alteration of the credit rating is usually by a notch, with possibility of a few notches if and when the change in the financial grounds and/ or asset quality is large.



C) Liquidity Positions

The credit rating is subject to alteration if there is a change in the issuer's financial management policy or in the relations with fund procurement sources and the change thereby makes its liquidity positions improve or deteriorate. The resultant alteration of the credit rating is usually by a notch, with possibility of a few notches if and when the change is large.

D) Related Parties' Status and Stance of Support/ Assistance for the Issuer

The credit rating is subject to alteration if there is a change in the issuer's parent company or subsidiary, guarantor or other provider of credit enhancement, or the government of the issuer's business domicile, or other related parties' own conditions and/ or position of support/ assistance for the issuer, and the change thereby makes its business bases, financial grounds and/ or liquidity positions improve or deteriorate, and/ or making the effectiveness of guarantee and other credit enhancement improve or deteriorate. The resultant alteration of the credit rating is usually a notch, with possibility of a few notches if and when the change is large.

E) Order of Seniority in Debt Payment and Non-Payment Forgiven by Contract

The credit rating is subject to alteration if there is a change in the rated debt's status in the order of seniority relative to other debts caused by the improvement/ deterioration of the issuer's financial condition. The resultant alteration of the credit rating is usually a notch, with possibility of a few notches if and when the change is large. Also, in case of the financial products for which non-payment of interest/ principal is contractually permissible, the credit rating is subject to alteration if and when the likelihood of such non-payment is projected to increase or decrease. The resultant alteration of the credit rating could be by a notch but often as much as a few notches.

F) Rise and Fall in General Economy and Markets

The credit rating herewith presented could be changed if and when the assumptions made at the time of its determination turn out to be inaccurate with regard to the issuer's parent company or subsidiaries, guarantor or other providers of credit enhancement, the government of the issuer's business domicile or other related parties' status and stance of support/ assistance for the issuer. The resultant change of the credit rating is most likely by a notch, as JCR speculates, but possibly as much as a few notches if there is a major change on the part of related parties, such as replacement, disappearance, some drastic improvement/ deterioration of financial grounds/ balances, etc.
