Rationale

- (1) Suntory Holdings Limited ("SHD") is the holding company of the Suntory Group (the "Group"). It has Japan's second largest soft drink producer of Suntory Beverage & Food Limited ("SBF") and the world's third largest sprints company of Beam Suntory Inc. under the umbrella. The Group has many leading brands such as Suntory Tennensui and BOSS for the non-alcoholic beverages and Jim Beam and Kinmugi for the alcoholic beverages. It also has high presence for the health & wellness products business, which it operates in Japan and Asia. Although SBF is independent from the Group to a certain extent as a listed company, JCR reflects the Group's entire creditworthiness, including SBF, in SHD's ratings given the Group's unity in terms of business operations and group strategies.
- (2) The business environment is severe due to soaring raw material prices and logistics costs, and others in addition to the COVID crisis and competitions among large manufacturers. Despite the fact, SHD has responded to the changes in the environment through making continuing efforts for cost reductions, and also consolidating and reorganizing the business structure of the domestic alcoholic beverage segment. SHD's robust business base, backed by favorable brands in the portfolio and geographical diversification, will unlikely sway. In addition, the financial base has become more risk resilient with progress in improvement and enhancement. JCR has affirmed the ratings on SHD and retained the Stable outlook. JCR will be able to evaluate the ratings more positively where we can ensure that SHD will likely be able to curb downturn of the profits and constantly increase the cash flow generation ability also under the situation where the cost rising pressure is becoming stronger.
- (3) For the fiscal year ended December 2021 (FY2021), operating income was 247.5 billion yen, up 14.0% over the year. It was the first increase in two fiscal years showing the recovery close to the pre-pandemic level. For both the non-alcoholic beverages and foods, and alcoholic beverages, the performances were primarily boosted by the demand recovery overseas. For FY2022, SHD expects an operating income of 248.0 billion yen. The projection reflects a reasonable amount of cost increase compared to the previous fiscal year; however, JCR assumes SHD's burden has increased more than it assumed at the beginning of the period due partly to the increased geopolitical risk. JCR will watch whether SHD can absorb the negative impacts by implementing cost structure reforms, adding value to alcoholic beverages, enhancing growth area in the health & wellness products, revising prices in Japan and overseas, among others.
- (4) The financial structure has been constantly improving and becoming better. At the end of FY2021, the net DER (considering the equity content of hybrid finance; the same applies here in after) declined to 0.5x with the most recent peak at 1.5x as at the end of FY2014, and interest-bearing debt/EBITDA was at a level within the range of 2x. In FY2021, equity attributable to owners of parent (equity capital under JGAAP) expanded from 1.1 trillion yen to 1.9 trillion yen. Although the total of goodwill and trademark rights is more than 2 trillion yen, there are no concerns over the performance of relevant businesses and risk of arising a large amount of impairment loss is low at present.

- The credit rating methodology assumes, in principle, to be applied to assess the likelihood of a given debt payment in light of its issuer's condition and business environment, etc. in the relevant future. There is certain limitation, however, in the time horizon that the rating foresees.
- The credit rating methodology assumes, in principle, that the factors posted in the below are particularly important for such likelihood to be determined, and that the rating determination is made by evaluating each of them not only quantitatively but also employing qualitative analyses.

A) Business Bases

The likelihood of a given debt payment is highly conditional to its issuer's business bases - how they can be maintained/ expanded into the future and thereby secure earnings and cash flows in adequacy and in a sustainable way.

B) Financial Grounds and Asset Quality

The likelihood of debt payment is highly dependent on the degree of the issuer's indebtedness and loss absorption capacity in terms of equity capital. Also notable is that a financial institution might see a significant loss of financial grounds as a result of changes in value of the assets under its possession.

C) Liquidity Positions

The likelihood of debt payment is highly dependent on the adequacy of the issuer's cash and other sources of repayment (liquidity positions).

D) Related Parties' Status and Stance of Support/ Assistance for the Issuer

The likelihood of debt payment is affected one way or the other by the issuer's related parties such as parent company, subsidiary, guarantor, and the government of the issuer's business domicile, etc. - by their own conditions and/ or position of support/ assistance for the issuer.

E) Order of Seniority in Debt Payment

The likelihood of debt payment can be different between given debts of the same issuer. The likelihood of debt payment for an individual debt is dependent on the issuer's discretion, and/ or its rank relative to other debts of the same issuer in the order of seniority in principal/ interest payment which is determined by design as financial product or by laws, etc.

A) Business Bases

The credit rating is subject to alteration if there is improvement or deterioration of the issuer's business bases, since its revenue, etc. may improve or deteriorate by the change in its business management policies, clients' preferences, competitive situation, or a technological innovation. The resultant alteration of the credit rating is usually by a notch, with possibility of a few notches if and when the change in the business bases is large.

B) Financial Grounds and Asset Quality

The credit rating is subject to alteration if the issuer increases/ decreases its debt/ capital or vice versa and thereby makes its individual debt payment liability less or more bearable and its loss absorption capacity into the future decreased or increased. Also, the changes in the quality of asset under the issuer's holding may affect the credit rating, since such changes could raise or lower the likelihood of future loss of the issuer's financial grounds. The resultant alteration of the credit rating is usually by a notch, with possibility of a few notches if and when the change in the financial grounds and/ or asset quality is large.

C) Liquidity Positions

The credit rating is subject to alteration if there is a change in the issuer's financial management policy or in the relations with fund procurement sources and the change thereby makes its liquidity positions improve or deteriorate. The resultant alteration of the credit rating is usually by a notch, with possibility of a few notches if and when the change is large.

D) Related Parties' Status and Stance of Support/ Assistance for the Issuer

The credit rating is subject to alteration if there is a change in the issuer's parent company or subsidiary, guarantor or other provider of credit enhancement, or the government of the issuer's business domicile, or other related parties' own conditions and/ or position of support/ assistance for the issuer, and the change thereby makes its business bases, financial grounds and/ or liquidity positions improve or deteriorate, and/ or making the effectiveness of guarantee and other credit enhancement improve or deteriorate.
